CAROLINE'S CANAL QUARTER UPDATE

Green Cllr Caroline Jackson wants a thriving community in the Canal **Ouarter**



Proposals to breathe new life into the Canal Quarter have been unveiled by the City Council. The 'masterplan' shows how a vibrant and sustainable neighbourhood with a mix of around 580 homes could be created, including homes with affordable rents.

Green Cllr Caroline Jackson, Leader of the Council, said: "We want new homes to create a thriving city centre community, and to help the owners of empty heritage buildings find new uses for them. The Council has bid for Government funding to help regenerate difficult-to-develop brownfield sites such as these."

MORECAMBE BAY SEWAGE CONCERNS

Green Cllr Dave Brookes contacted United Utilities following concerns raised over the summer that sewage may have been discharged into Morecambe Bay.

After a meeting with UU representatives, Dave said: "I was told that recent investments have greatly reduced the chances of untreated sewage being discharged during heavy and prolonged rainfall. But we know that climate change will lead to more extreme weather, so more needs to be done."

Action by individuals can also help protect our bathing waters. For example, disposing of kitchen fats in a container in the bin rather than down the sink, and not flushing wet wipes down the toilet.

LANCASTER SLAVERY EXHIBITION

Lancaster Slavery Family Trees is an exhibition documenting the stories of enslaved Africans, based on local research by the City Council museums department and the Lancaster Black History Group.

It will be in Lancaster City Museum in Market Square until the end of February. Cllr Alistair Sinclair said:

"This is a very moving exhibition. The work by Lancaster Black History Group is invaluable in fighting racism."

GINA LEADS FRACKING DEBATE

County Cllr Gina Dowding forced a debate on fracking at a recent County Council meeting. This resulted in a unanimous vote to ask the Government to ensure that any decisions on fracking applications are made locally by the County Council.

Fracking is a big concern for people in North Lancashire, and the Green Party is leading the way to make sure it will never return to our region.

Interviewed on BBC North West, Cllr Gina Dowding said:

"There is no evidence that fracking is safer than when the Government called for a halt to fracking back in 2019.

"However, there is abundant evidence that renewable energy sources are the cheapest and cleanest way to ensure our energy security and reduce carbon emissions.

"The Conservative Government should honour its manifesto commitment not to bring back fracking, so we can focus instead on implementing real solutions to the climate and energy crises."

JACK'S CALL TO STOP ATTACK ON NATURE

Green Parliamentary candidate for Lancaster, Cllr Jack Lenox, has written to local Conservative councillors urging them to resist Government plans to rip up environmental protections.

Jack said:

"The Government intends to let many of our current environmental protections expire in 2023, scrap planning rules that protect nature, and withdraw plans to help farmers protect nature.

"It was recently reported that global wildlife populations have plummeted by 70% since 1970. We need to do much more to conserve wildlife and habitats - not less."

The RSPB and the National Trust have also expressed their outrage at the Government's proposals.

NEW HOSPITAL PLANS?

The Royal Lancaster Infirmary could have a state-of-theart hospital on a new site. That is the preferred option announced by the New Hospitals Programme (NHP).

Green CIIr Sally Maddocks went to an NHP event. She said: "New sites are being considered by the M6 Junction 34 and near the university. Another option could be an improved Royal Lancaster Infirmary on its current site including a new 'urgent and emergency care village'."

BUDGET CRISIS HITS CITY COUNCIL

Soaring energy prices and inflation, and relentless long-term funding cuts to local councils have created a big gap between the Council's income and expenditure.

The Conservative Government has cut funding to local councils for more than a decade. The City Council's budget is now around £4m smaller than it was in 2010, and yet the need for local public services grows every year.

Cllr Tim Hamilton-Cox, City Council Cabinet Member, said: "Councils all over the country are facing the same problems as we are. We are aiming to reduce the amount of council office buildings to cut running costs and find further 'operational efficiencies'.

"However, cuts to some services seem inevitable unless Government increases the funding to Councils.

"The City Council is working hard to make its buildings energy efficient, and is putting a big solar array on one of its properties at White Lund which will generate power and income for the Council next year. Plans are also underway for a new solar farm on Council land."
