## Council's Climate Action Plan Published

Lancaster City Council has published the first stage of its Climate Emergency Action Plan, aiming to reduce its own carbon emissions to net zero by 2030. Actions include building solar farms at Salt Ayre leisure centre and tip, electrifying the Council's vehicle fleet, and moving away from gas for heating buildings. Further stages of the plan will look at Council housing and how the Council can influence wider change across the district. There are plans to set up a 'Citizen's Jury' on this topic in early 2020.

Planning applications for ten or more homes will need to set out how they will save and generate energy, under a scheme currently out for consultation. Green Cllr Tim Dant, who proposed the change, said: *“Current planning policy doesn’t allow us to insist that developers include extra measures to tackle the climate emergency. Fixing this is much harder than it should be, but in the meantime this scheme will help to send the message that this is a high priority for the Council.”*

## More plastics in kerbside recycling

Thanks to Cllr Gina Dowding’s campaigning at County level, the City Council can now collect any tubs, pots or trays with a 1, 2 or 5 symbol (see left) via your kerbside box for recycling, along with plastic bottles. All items need to be clean and free of food residues.

## Riverside View says “No” to link footpath

Residents of Riverside View off New Quay Road have voted *not* to have a footpath linking their estate to Willow Lane. The consultation resulted in 125 out of 147 (85%) voting against the proposal - giving noise, disturbance and anti-social behaviour as their reasons.

Cllr Mandy Bannon said *“It’s disappointing that the £7,000 earmarked for the footpath has to be returned to the developers. So I have written to Barratt Homes and Redrow to ask if they’ll consider donating some of it to Marsh Community Centre who do such valuable work with local children and young people.”*

## NEWS FROM YOUR GREEN MEP

*My first four months as an MEP have been very busy. I have organised visits to the European Parliament for two groups of young people from the North West. The climate strikers were delighted to find that their demands for action are certainly being heard in Europe, and a group of aspiring young women leaders were inspired by the work of MEPs. ## Freeman’s Wood update

The Public Inquiry to decide whether the Wood can be protected as a Town Green was held at the end of August.

Local people successfully raised £17,000 to pay for legal fees, and sixteen witnesses gave evidence in support of the Town Green.

As Green View went to press, the Inquiry’s Planning Inspector had not yet given his verdict.

## Towneley Close handrail

The Fairfield Association has raised more than £1,000 to pay for a handrail for Towneley Close. Lancashire County Council is contributing £800 and is expected to fit it soon.
